2) Where do you get most of your news/information from?

3) Spend a moment as a group brainstorming all the places people look for truth in our world today. Really think about this. What are our main sources of truth? Has this changed from 20 years ago?

4) According to Sunday's message, does anyone recall what the scroll at the end of Revelation 10 represents?

Read 1 Peter 1:10-12

5) According to v10-11, how did we get the news of God's salvation for all mankind? Who "got the word" so that we could have gospel here our bibles today?

Read Matthew 13:17

6) Matthew is pointing out that the prophets themselves didn't get to see the messiah or get to see exactly how God was going to bring salvation to His people. We get to read about the life of Jesus and the full gospel in a way they didn't. How might this change the way you see the Bible?

7) The scroll in Revelation 10 is both sweet and bitter when John eats it, what is the significance of this?

8) Going back to what we talked about in the very beginning, what does it look like for us to place God's word above all other sources of truth in our lives? What sources of truth may compete with it?

9) Sharing God's word with others can be both bitter and sweet, how so?
